Fiscal Year 2024/25 Budget

Had a meeting with Kevin and Dina to review projected year end numbers. This review can be found on pages 25-47 in the Board update. Our next meeting is scheduled for February 26th and will begin to plug numbers into the 2024/25 proposed budget. My goal is to get the budget approved at the May 16th Board meeting.

OSLAD Grant Update

On January 30th, Gov. Pritzker announced that 54.9 million in grants were awarded and we are one of the district's that received an award. You may read the Governor's press release announcement on pages 15-22 in the Board update. With that said, I now have a clear picture on the amount of money needed in bond sales.

Capital Projects

Now that it's a given that we got the OSLAD grant, work has begun to get all the finances in order. Besides the OSLAD project, splashpad needs, parking lot repaving and other projects to be determined as we go through the budget process, I'll be working on a separate capital improvement budget that will tie into the operation budget.

The Latest Legislative Issues Affecting Parks, Recreation and Conservation

RE: \$28 Million in PARC Grants Announced

Today, the Governor's office formally announced more than \$28 million for PARC grants to 13 park districts, conservation districts, and other recreation agencies to construct, renovate, and improve recreational facilities. The Governor's press release is available by clicking here.

PARC funding is made available through the Rebuild Illinois capital program and was the direct result of IAPD's advocacy efforts in 2019.

As Peter stated in the Governor's press release: "The PARC program is one of the most significant grant opportunities administered by the IDNR for park, recreation, and conservation agencies, and allows them to acquire and develop land for recreational purposes. The PARC program creates jobs, supports small businesses and labor, promotes physical and mental health, helps educate and provide jobs to youth, and improves the environment. IAPD thanks the governor and the IDNR for their continued investment in recreational opportunities in communities throughout Illinois."

IAPD congratulates all of the PARC Grant recipients:

City of Anna (Union County) - \$2.8 million

Plans are to redesign the city ballpark and create a more usable, efficient, and disabled-accessible facility for the community. The current ballpark is dilapidated and has no disabled accessibility, sidewalks, or accessible parking.

Arlington Heights Park District (Cook County) - \$2.8 million

This project consists of renovating the interior of an existing building, converting it to a bathhouse, demolishing the existing lap pool and children's pool, and building a new Olympic-sized lap pool and children's water play area. Site improvements will make the pool, the children's area, and the bathhouse building Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant.

Batavia Park District (Kane County) - \$2.8 million

A commercial office building purchased by the park district in 2021 will be repurposed into a community recreation center to increase indoor recreation space. Planned renovations include demolition of existing offices, restrooms and closets; installation of an elevator; and carpentry, drywall, electrical, mechanicals, and plumbing, along with safety systems, finishes and furniture. A parking lot will be modified to be disabled accessible.

Village of Crossville (White County) - \$324,047

Plans are to supply Crossville's Tiger Park with ADA-accessible sidewalks, parking spaces, and restrooms to replace outdated facilities and non-compliant walkways. The existing pavilion will be rewired to update and increase use of the structure. Pickleball courts will be constructed to add an additional recreation component to the park.

Decatur Park District (Macon County) - \$2.8 million

Plans are to renovate the former Scoville Golf Course Clubhouse into a recreational senior center that will feature a range of activities to serve an array of interests, expectations, and needs for the community's mature populations. Currently, senior recreational services take place in three separate locations in Decatur. The new space will offer daily exercise programs and activities like art classes, lectures, music enrichment, cards, games, and some meal service.

Macon County Conservation District (Macon County) - \$870,750

This project consists of renovating existing office space into program space to accommodate the existing increase in program participants and allow for further expansion of programs. It will include expansion of the existing program space into an outdoor classroom with chalkboard, demonstration gardens, science lab, kitchen area, seat walls, fire pit, and interpretive kiosks.

Glenview Park District (Cook County) - \$2.8 million

Plans are to update finishes and add new mechanical systems and other features to the aging aquatics center. Work will include removal and replacement of the pool basin finish systems, refreshed decking materials, and new paint and acoustics on walls and ceilings. The pool mechanical system will be enlarged and refreshed with a system that can service all three pools with independent temperature controls and filtration. A retractable pool ninja course will be added in the lap pool, as well as a replacement play feature in the activity pool.

Park District of Highland Park (Lake County) – \$2.8 million

A new community center at West Ridge Park will replace the aging West Ridge Center with a new, sustainable facility with increased recreational capacity, improved disabled accessibility, and green space. The facility will include a dedicated gymnastics gym, flexible spaces for youth enrichment, and visual and performing arts programs.

Northbrook Park District (Cook County) - \$2.8 million

Plans are to renovate the interior of the Leisure Center to respond to a growing demand for diverse recreational program offerings. The project includes adding a knowledge center, an innovation lounge, a sensory/de-escalation lounge, and a technology and training room. It also includes renovating multipurpose rooms, activity studios, demonstration kitchen, a costume shop, a flexible performance space, and making restrooms ADA-compliant and gender neutral.

Oak Lawn Park District (Cook County) - \$2.1 million

The proposed remodel of the Memorial Park Recreation Center will include converting smaller rooms, such as locker rooms, shower facilities, and storage areas, into larger multipurpose rooms and new restrooms. The entry vestibule will be changed to a lobby and reception area.

City of Rock Island (Rock Island County) - \$901,800

Plans are to replace the 95-year-old clubhouse at Saukie Golf Course with a new facility to better serve golfers and all users while maintaining the golf course's historical significance. The current clubhouse is beyond its useful life and in a state of deterioration. The new clubhouse will include meeting space, seating areas, office, kitchen and dining area, two golf simulators, and outdoor seating facing the course. It will create a more welcoming and fully accessible starting and ending point for golfers and provide year-round space for learning and enrichment activities with indoor hitting bays and simulators.

Rockford Park District (Winnebago County) - \$2.8 million

The project is the development of the 50-acre Clarence Hicks Sports Park, including an eight-lane running track; a multi-purpose sports field with artificial turf for football, soccer, and lacrosse; throw and jump event areas; a spectator area with bleacher seating for 1,000; parking lot with solar lights; and landscape improvements.

City of Woodstock (McHenry County) - \$2.8 million

This project includes remediation work to prolong the life of the Woodstock Recreation Center, a Woodstock-owned indoor facility that supports the city's extensive recreational programs. Plans are to seal the pool area to eliminate condensation issues; remove and replace the gymnasium roof, exterior doors, electrical panels and exterior siding; renovate the pool, hot tub and sauna; add an ADA lift to the pool area; improve parking lot drainage; add a disabled accessible restroom; and more.

Gov. Pritzker, IDNR announce \$54.9 million in grants for 111 local park and recreation projects throughout Illinois

Press Release - Tuesday, January 30, 2024

SPRINGFIELD - Nearly \$55 million in state grants are being awarded for 111 local park projects throughout Illinois to help communities acquire land and develop recreational opportunities, Gov. JB Pritzker announced today.

For the second year in a row, the governor ensured funding was set aside for economically distressed communities, resulting in 32 underserved locations receiving \$18.7 million in grants from the **Open Space Land Acquisition and Development**, or OSLAD, program. This is the 37th year for the program, which is administered by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

"Since day one as Governor, it's been my mission to support the health and well-being of Illinoisans," said Governor JB Pritzker. "With funding from the OLSAD program, municipalities across Illinois will have the opportunity to expand and improve local neighborhood parks through sport and recreational space, plants, playgrounds, and more. All across Illinois, we're enhancing our state's natural beauty and creating safer, healthier, and happier communities."

Established by the Illinois General Assembly in 1986, OSLAD is a cost-sharing program between state and local governments that helps communities fund land acquisition and development for parks and outdoor recreation projects. It's become one of the most popular grant programs in Illinois. Since it was established, OSLAD has awarded nearly \$585 million for park projects throughout Illinois (including the awards announced today).

"I appreciate Governor Pritzker's continued efforts to ensure funding for the OSLAD program, which is a vital tool for communities to build safe, engaging, and accessible outdoor spaces for their residents," **said IDNR Director Natalie Phelps Finnie.** "An investment in the outdoors is an investment in the health and well-being of the people of Illinois. We know that 83% of Illinoisans consider access to outdoor recreational opportunities important for them and their families. And studies show time and again that that getting outside leads to better overall health."

Among the OSLAD park projects included in this round of funding is renovation of Crispus Attucks Park in Carbondale, an economically distressed community. The Carbondale Park District plans to replace the park's current playground equipment, which has fallen into disrepair. Updates will include the addition of disabled-accessible flooring, swings and playground equipment, as there is no other accessible park in the area that is suitable for children as young as 3 up to teenagers.

Additionally, plans call for installing a zip line and a climbing structure, neither of which are community park features found in southern Illinois. The park district expects the renovation will bring excitement and enjoyment to the neighborhood, as well as a sense of community pride.

"The Carbondale Park District is thrilled to learn that we have been chosen for an OSLAD grant for Attucks Park. This park holds a significant place in the history of Carbondale and for the people it honors," said Trey Anderson, executive director of the Carbondale Park District. "This project is much needed and will help the surrounding community by offering an upgraded play area for enhanced outdoor activity and community inclusion. Thank you to the State of Illinois and IDNR for investing in our neighborhoods with safe and accessible playgrounds."

Also receiving OSLAD funding is Harristown, a Macon County village of about 1,300 residents, one-third of whom are youth under the age of 19, yet there is no public park or playground for children and families to enjoy.

With the help of a \$150,000 OSLAD grant, the village board of trustees plans to build a park and playground that will have a pavilion, sitting areas, walking path, a disabled-accessible playground, a half basketball court, and pickleball courts. The village intends to utilize general funds and donations to match the OSLAD grant.

"The Village of Harristown is extremely happy to be receiving an OSLAD grant from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. A community park has long been a hope for our residents, as this will be the only public park for our village," **Harristown Mayor Evelyn Deverell said.** "We have an unwavering commitment to building a park that will meet the needs of our community and its residents. Our citizens and board of trustees will all work together to use these funds in a way that serves Harristown."

"OSLAD is one of the state's most significant grant programs. For more than 30 years, it has raised the quality of life in communities throughout Illinois," **said Peter Murphy, president and CEO of the Illinois Association of Park Districts.** "We commend Governor Pritzker and the General Assembly for their strong support and continued investment in local park and recreation projects that create opportunities for Illinois youth."

Some of the other projects awarded OSLAD grants include:

- City of Toulon Renovation of the city park, including adding a splash pad; resurfacing the half basketball court and adding an adjustable hoop for use by multiple age groups; updating the full-size basketball court into a multi-use court for basketball, tennis and pickleball; installation of a sign language panel and disabled-accessible playground equipment; and the addition of exercise equipment for all ages.
- Alsip Park District Development of the 22.65-acre Freedom Park, featuring the first set of outdoor pickleball courts in the park district and a single-track mountain bike course, a nine-hole disc golf course, a monarch waystation, replacement of the 20-year-old playground, and extension of walking paths to connect to the regional Cal-Sag Trail.

new native prairie savannah at North Grove Park's east edge, native shade trees, educational signage, and more.

• Village of Ford Heights - Development of an outdoor community recreation area, including expanded playground facilities, three basketball courts, a concession stand, a football/multi-use field with space for spectators, walking path, and lighting to ensure safety.

• City of Mound City - Improvements to the existing city park, including disabled accessible walking path and connecting sidewalks, a disabled accessible parking area, a new playground structure and ground cover pad, replacement of the basketball court, and additional benches.

"Our neighborhood parks are the heart of our community," **said State Senator Napoleon Harris III** of Harvey, whose district includes Ford Heights. "The investments the OSLAD program is making in the Ford Heights Park District will promote an active and healthy community. It is important that we continue to look for ways to expand and improve our local parks to create spaces we can all use and enjoy."

"The OSLAD Program has served a tremendous role in connecting underserved communities to the great outdoors, and it's great to see a major investment throughout the 47th District," said State Senator Neil Anderson of Andalusia, whose district includes five economically distressed communities that will receive OSLAD grants. "Whether it is modernizing our parks, or revitalizing an empty space, it's crucial for small communities to have a place to gather and connect in nature."

"Our parks and recreational facilities add so much to our communities. They are places to get healthy, to learn, to enjoy nature, to find beauty and solace, and to have fun with friends and family," said State Rep. Joyce Mason of Gurnee in Lake County. "Illinois OSLAD grants are an important investment in our neighborhoods, and these funds will mean so much to the residents of Lake County."

"Investing in our outdoor spaces and local parks is a great opportunity to enrich the lives of many seeking a new modernized all-inclusive space for all," **said State Senator Dale Fowler** of Harrisburg. "The OSLAD program not only invests in parks and recreation, but it also fosters a healthier, happier community for all."

Decennial Committee

On June 10, 2022, the Decennial Committees on Local Government Efficiency Act (the "Act") was signed into law by Illinois Governor J.B. Pritzker (P.A. 102-1088). The Act requires all units of local government that may levy a tax, except municipalities and counties, to convene a committee to "study local efficiencies and report recommendations regarding efficiencies and increased accountability." Since school districts are not "units of local government" under the Illinois Constitution (See Article VII, Sec. 1) and the Illinois Statute on Statutes (5 ILCS 70/1.28), the part of the Act requiring committee formation is not applicable to them. The committee must be comprised of: (1) the elected/appointed members of the unit of local government's governing board; (2) at least two individuals who reside in the unit of local government's district; and (3) the unit of local government's chief executive officer (or another officer). Importantly, the committee must be formed by the unit of local government by June 10, 2023.

The Act requires the committee to meet at least three times. The committee may meet during a regularly scheduled board meeting, so long as: (1) a separate notice for the committee meeting is given in accordance with the Open Meetings Act; (2) the committee meeting is listed as part of the board's agenda; and (3) at least a majority of the members of the committee are present at the meeting. In addition, the Act requires the committee to allow for public comment lasting at least three minutes per speaker. Furthermore, the Act requires the committee to survey the residents who attended the meeting and request their input regarding the issues discussed at the meeting. Finally, the committee must summarize its findings in a written report and provide the report to the county board for the county in which the unit of local government is located within eighteen months of the formation of the committee. In the report, the committee must include its recommendations regarding increased accountability and efficiency. Once the committee has written the required report and sent it to the county board, the committee is dissolved. However, the Act requires the unit of local government to appoint a new committee and repeat the process outlined above every ten years.

Public Act 102-1088 requires each park district to approve the annual report regarding improving fiscal efficiency through shared services or outsourcing at an open meeting with an opportunity for public comment, in accordance with the Open Meetings Act. In addition, the school district must also publish the report on the district's website.

The first meeting will be on March 21, 2024 at 5:30pm; this meeting will be an introductory meeting to discuss the process. Decennial Committee Meetings are open to the public.

The Golf Maine Park District ("Park District) formed its Decennial Committee on Local Government Efficiency on May 25, 2023, to study efficiencies and report recommendations regarding those efficiencies and increased accountability to 50 ILCS 70/1, et seq. (the "Committee").

Golf Maine Park District Fiscal Year 2024/25 Budget Fund Descriptions

I. REVENUE FUNDS

Fees and Admissions

Fees and Admissions are user fees collected in exchange for participating in a program as well as rental fees collected for private use of our facilities and parks.

Property Tax

Property tax is a tax that is based on a property's value. It is sometimes called an "ad valorem" tax, which means "according to value." The property tax is a local tax imposed by local government taxing districts (e.g., school districts, municipalities, counties) and administered by local officials (e.g. township assessors, chief county assessment officers, local boards of review, county collectors). Property taxes are collected and spent at the local level.

Other Taxes

Replacement Tax (or other taxes), also known as Personal Property Replacement Tax, is a tax imposed as of July 1, 1979, on income of corporations, subchapter S corporations, partnerships, and trusts. This tax replaces money lost by local governments when their power to impose personal property taxes was taken away. Replacement tax is collected from corporations, subchapter S corporations, partnerships, and trusts by the State of Illinois and paid to local governments.

Investment/Misc

Investment revenue is interest earned on a bank account and/or other type of investments (i.e. CD). Miscellaneous revenue may include, but not limited to a donation to the park district or a safety/health incentive offered by risk management provider.

II. EXPENSE FUNDS

Workers Compensation Fund

Illinois workers' compensation insurance, also known as workers' comp insurance or workman's comp, accounts for benefits to your employees if they get hurt or sick from their job. This coverage can help pay for your employee's medical bills and replace most of their lost wages.

Corporate Fund

The Corporate Fund accounts for the general revenues and expenditures of the Park District which are not included in other funds.

Audit Fund

The audit fund accounts for a comprehensive financial analysis of the **Park District's** operations and procedures when it comes to handling public finances.

Recreation Fund

The Recreation Fund accounts for the revenues and expenditures related to a wide variety of programs and facilities within the Golf Maine Park District.

Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF)

The IMRF Fund accounts for the employer share of the pension contribution.

Liability Insurance Fund

The General Liability Fund accounts for property, liability and worker's compensation insurance premium expenses.

Social Security Fund

The Social Security Fund accounts for the employer share of the Social Security and Medicare taxes.

Unemployment Insurance Fund

Unemployment insurance accounts for a a state-operated insurance program designed to partially replace lost wages when employee(s) are out of work. Like fire, accident, health and other types of insurance, it is for an emergency: when you are temporarily or permanently out of a job, or if you work less than full time because of lack of work.

Capital Improvement Fund

The Capital Projects Fund accounts for financial resources to be used for capital projects and major repairs/renovations not accounted for in other funds. Bond fund proceeds are typically allocated in this fund however can be taken out of operations as well.

Handicapped Recreation Fund

The Maine Niles Association of Special Recreation (MNASR) Fund accounts for the disbursement of funds for the expenses to provide joint recreational programs for the handicapped and costs related to the accessibility of the District's facilities and sites.

Police Fund

This fund shall be used for the organization and maintaining of a police system including the hiring of a regular policeman or police force for the purpose of policing the parks and playgrounds maintained within the district. This can be active duty, retired or possibility a security company.

Bond & Interest Fund

The Bond & Interest Fund accounts for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of general obligation debt principal and interest.

Paving & Lighting Fund

This fund shall be used for for the purpose of constructing, maintaining, and lighting streets and roadways within the parks and playgrounds maintained by the district.



"Soaring to Heights Conference" Report on Sessions Attended

Friday, January 26, 2024

Legal/Legislative, Part 1 (8:30am-9:30am)

New laws and court decisions were discussed. Changes in Park District code and other legal requirements presented and discussed. New legal requirements that may affect individual district operations along with statutory changes were reviewed.

Legal/Legislative, Part 2 (10:00am-11:00am

A continuation of part 1 session as to what needs to be done to maintain legal compliance.

Exhibit Hall Visit (11:15am-12:00pm)

Spent some time at the Vortex booth (Ryan Eccles) to discuss our splashpad issues. Tyler Dailey from Aquatic Design Partners joined us. Will be scheduling to have a pressure test done to evaluate if there are any broken pipes under the concrete slab. Results from this testing will help determine next move on what direction we will go to get the splashpad up and running on time. Kevin, Alexis and Puneet also joined us at this meeting.

Went to visit Tod Stanton (Design Perspective) to discuss his professional services that I would like him to perform regarding OSLAD project. We chatted about the scope of services and he will get back to me with proposal.
